Unit Journal of Events--66th Ftr Sqdn, 57th Ftr Gp. Bagnoli, Italy Prepared by A.N. Apostolou, Capt, AC. 1 August 1945 to 3 August 1945

- 1. Almost complete inactivity reigned in the areatoday, twelve hours after the windup of last evening's stag festivities. Reveille and police-details had been suspended by the first sergeant. Indolent, lethargic, and---for the most part ---oblivious of their surroundings, the officers and men of the squadron passed the day in their bunks.
- 2. The waiting is over.

The move is at hand. At this morning's roll-call formation, the men were officially alerted---embarkation will take place within the next 48 hours. Passes, of course, were immediately cancelled. In the afternoon the Italian lire belonging to the GIs was turned in for exchange to American bills---in itself an event of not limited proportions. A last physical examination was conducted by Captain Tattersal. Supply issued its final salvage issue. PX rations were put on sale at 1400 hours. As loading details packed the remaining equipment, a rush of letters were written to catch today's twelve-noon deadline at the mail office.

5. The loose ends were being tied together swiftly today while the advance echelon---dock-guards, loading crews---motored to the Naples' docks, where the troopship "SEA OWL" is berthed, waiting to be boarded for the 15,000mile jaunt ahead.

Back in the area, crisp five and ten-dollar American folding money was given to the men who gingerly handled the cash with tender fondness.

Only one more night on Italian land ...
